- Group of PB employees volunteered time to collect trash, keeping it out of the waterway.





Josephine County Food Bank Drives

- Multiple food drives in 2023 spring and fall/winter
- 202 Pounds of food collected in December drive = 242 meals
- Donation of 580 lbs of fresh corn post Cornsilk harvest.
- Josephine county FB supports over 15,000 people every month.

Cheney Creek Restoration Work

- Pulling Invasive species Himalayan Blackberry and Garlic Mustard
- Volunteers mostly come after work on own time to pull invasives.
- Continued commitment to our natural buffers on the farm, as local wildlife rely on these areas.

Waste Streams

- Work with Terracycle to upcycle disposable gloves, hair/beard nets, and masks - Keeping them out of the landfill
 - 41 lbs of gloves collected
- Extensive recycling program on site.
- Compost food scraps, and paper towels to be used on farm

Sustainable Energy

- Use of solar panels to offset ~30% of energy usage
- Blue Sky member through Pacific
 Power = 100% of required electricity is
 from renewable sources

Regenerative Organic Certified®

- New certification obtained by Pacific Botanicals in 2023
 - Silver level certified
- Certification's baseline is NOP Organic, and focuses on:
 - Soil health, Worker Fairness, and Animal Husbandry.
- Long standing practices on farm aligned well with certification
 - Cover cropping, crop rotation, on-site composting, no synthetic fertilizers, etc.



By the Numbers - 2022

- Total Time Volunteered: 79 hours
- Total Diesel Usage*: 2,440 gallons
- Total Propane Usage**: 26,888 gallons
- Total Petrol Usage: 490 gallons

**Use includes dryers, shop, and forklift

Carbon Scoping Exercise

- Used Cool Farm Tool to scope out carbon emissions for Ashwagandha Crop grown at Pacific Botanicals
- Found Tool was not best suited for botanical agricultural production.
 - Better for monocultured commodity crops
- Still good information was discovered
 - Identified drying as largest emitter
 - Implementing Air-Knife on wash-line in 2023 to help reduce propane



Future Goals of Team

- Continued opportunities for employees to engage in volunteer activities, as well as educational events.
- Reduction of waste, and emissions generated on site
 - Find new streams to repurpose existing waste
- Complete scoping on more crops grown on farm, as well sourced ingredients.
 - Collaborating with industry partners
- Implementation of waste stream training for employees.
